I'm Joni Eareckson Tada, and when I was seventeen years old I broke my neck in a diving accident that left me a quadriplegic. I struggled initially, trying to comprehend how such a tragedy could be part of God's plan for me. Thanks to the love of our heavenly Father and the support of family and friends, I was able to grasp a different perspective on my disabilities and a renewed sense of purpose for my life. In 1979, I started Joni and Friends to advocate for those with disabilities and to help the church better understand how to come alongside families affected by disability.


