Dear Parent or Caregiver,

Thank you for taking the time to read *God Made Me AND You* to your child. This book was written to help you teach your child about the beauty of God’s design for diversity in His image-bearers, with a particular focus on ethnic diversity.

I wrote this little book because I am convinced from Scripture that ethnic diversity is not something that should be begrudgingly tolerated but rather enthusiastically celebrated! Passages like Revelation 7:9-10 speak very loudly to God’s ultimate purpose in the gospel—a redeemed, ethnically diverse people worshipping God together for all eternity.

God was intentional in the ways He made us to differ from each other. Like the facets of a jewel, the glory of God shines all the more brightly as the light of His gospel is reflected through different vessels. Conversely, God has determined that without ethnic diversity, we lose the ability to see God shine in particular ways that would have only been possible had there been diversity (Ephesians 2:14-19).

Sadly, in the realm of ethnicity, sin has done what it usually does. It has taken something meant to glorify God and distorted it. The sins of racism, bigotry, and ethnic pride have manifested themselves in many ways in our racially-charged culture, both historically and in the present day. These social sins are learned by children, often from family members, media, or peers.

The gospel offers us a new way. Not just for us, but for our children. When the Lord Jesus stretched out His hands on the cross, He did it not only with particular people in mind, but with particular people groups in mind (Revelation 7:9). The Son of God is so glorious, nothing less than the nations would suffice as His chosen community of worshipers. As Christians, we have the privilege of participating in what God is doing in redemptive history! We also have the responsibility to teach our children this kingdom perspective. Countercultural, biblical views don’t just happen. They must be taught.

I pray that the Lord will use this book to help all who read it see the purposeful beauty in how God made us all different, and that it would lead to a lifelong embrace and pursuit of ethnic diversity for the glory of God.

You will be expelled if you can't keep this rule!"


“Don’t be afraid
